*Top Row* — 1. "Rib and Bead" miniature open sugar, 2½ inches high. 2. Cream pitcher, 3 inches high. These two pieces are in unusual rectangular shape. 3. "Zipper Slash" by George A. Duncan's Sons, Washington, Pa., toothpick holder, 2½ inches high. 4. Tumbler, 3½ inches high. 5. "Petalled Medallion", miniature open sugar, 2⅝ inches high. 6. Miniature cream pitcher, 2⅝ inches high. 7. "Bordered Ellipse" tumbler, 3¾ inches high. 8. Mug, 3⅝ inches high. 9. "Pillow Encircled" or "Ruby Rosette" tumbler, flared top, 3½ inches high. 10. Salt Shaker, 2½ inches high. 11. Footed sauce, 2¼ inches high. 12. Tumbler, amber-stained etching, 3⅞ inches high.

*Second Row* — "Teardrop and Thumbprint" by Ripley and Co., Pittsburgh, not to be confused with "Crystal Wedding" Plate 10, third row. 1. Goblet, 6 inches high. 2. Tumbler, 3¾ inches high. 3. Wine, 4¼ inches high. 4. "Amazon" by Bryce Bros., Pittsburgh, also called "Sawtooth Band", wine, 4⅛ inches high. 5. Cordial, 3¼ inches high. 6. "Roanoke" by U.S. Glass Co., Pittsburgh, tumbler, 3¾ inches high. 7. Sauce dish, 4¼ inches high. 8. "Lacy Medallion" by U.S. Glass Co., Pittsburgh, wine, with gilt, 4⅛ inches high. 9. Toothpick holder, 2¼ inches high. 10. Tumbler, 3¾ inches high. 11. "Bull's Eye Band" or "Reverse Torpedo", toothpick holder, 2⅛ inches high. 12. Wine, 3⅞ inches high. 13. "Double Beaded Band", wine, 4 inches high. 14. Goblet, 5¾ inches high.

*Third Row* — 1. "Thompson No. 77" or "Truncated Cube", goblet, 6 inches high. 2. Wine, 3⅞ inches high. 3. Tumbler, 3⅞ inches high. 4. Miniature cream pitcher, 2⅞ inches high. 5. "Co-op No. 190" made in 1892 by Co-operative Flint Glass Co., Beaver Falls, Pa., tumbler, 3⅝ inches high. 6. Wine, 4⅛ inches high. 7. "Heart Band" by several factories, including McKee Glass Co., Pittsburgh, open sugar, applied handles, 2¾ inches high. 8. Cream pitcher, 2¾ inches high. 9. Tumbler, 3¾ inches high. 10. "Block and Star" or "Block and Star Spearpoint" or "Waffle and Star Band", all three names are for the same pattern which originally was made by the Tarentum Glass Co. of Tarentum, Pa., under the name "Verona", which is now the name of a plain, no pattern clear glass. 10. Rectangular sauce, 2⅞ inches high. 11. Goblet, 6¼ inches high.

*Fourth Row* — 1. "Zippered Block" by Duncan and Miller Glass Co., Washington, Pa., sauce, 1⅞ inches high, 4¼ inches diameter. 2. Goblet, 6½ inches high. 3. Tumbler, 4 inches high. 4. "York Herringbone" solid red-stained toothpick holder, 2½ inches high. 5. Spoonholder, 4⅞ inches high. 6. Miniature cream pitcher, 3⅞ inches high. 7. Tumbler, 3¾ inches high. 8. Wine, 4⅞ inches high. 9. "Flat Panel" or "Pleating" was originally "No. 15003" by U.S. Glass Co., Pittsburgh, and was also made by Bryce Bros. and Gillander and Sons, both of Pittsburgh. 9. Footed sauce, 2⅞ inches high. 10. Goblet, 6 inches high. 11. Small bowl, 1½ inches high.

*Bottom Row* — 1. "Dakota" or "Baby Thumbprint", by Doyle and Co., and later by U.S. Glass Co., Pittsburgh, Tumbler, 3⅝ inches high. 2. Goblet, etched, 6¾ inches high. 3. Wine, etched, 4¼ inches high. 4. "Fans with Crossbars", rare tray, 14 inches long, 8½ inches wide, 1¾ inches high. 5. Wine, 4 inches high. 6. Goblet, 6 inches high. 7. Spoonholder, 4¾ inches high.
