

PLATE 7.

Top Row — Because there are at least four different patterns which have the original name of "Victoria", this pattern has the name of the maker "Pioneer" added to become the popular "Pioneer's Victoria" pattern. Made in Pittsburgh during the late 1880's and early 1890's by the Pioneer Glass Co., the ruby-stain on this pattern was applied in different locations on the item. 1. Celery vase, clear top, ruby-stained elliptical thumbprint band and lower, flat diamonds, 6½ inches high. 2. Tumbler, same staining as preceding No. 1, 3½ inches high. 3. Goblet, matches tumbler No. 2, 6⅞ inches high. Compare this goblet and preceding tumbler with number 5 and 6, this row. Notice the different location of ruby-stain on same pieces. 4. Tankard water pitcher, 11¾ inches high. 5. Goblet, ruby-stained top, 6⅞ inches high. 6. Tumbler, ruby-stained top, 3⅞ inches high. 7. Cruet, unusual attached, pressed spout, 7½ inches high, including rare, original, stained stopper.

Second Row — This pattern is currently called "O'Hara Diamond" although it was also known as "Sawtooth and Star" and "No. 15001". It was made by the O'Hara Glass Co., Pittsburgh and later by the U. S. Glass Co. 1. Goblet, 6¼ inches high. 2. Cup and saucer, cup 2⅜ inches high, saucer 5¼ inches diameter. 3. Spoonholder, serrated edge, 4¾ inches high. 4. Berry bowl, large serrated edge, 3½ inches high, 8¼ inches diameter. 5. Cream pitcher, 5½ inches high. 6. Tumbler, 3⅞ inches high. 7. Cruet, 7 inches high.

Third Row — Currently called "Triple Triangle" this was Doyle and Co.'s "No. 76", made about 1891. It was also pictured in Pioneer's catalogue as well as U.S. Glass Co. 1. Water pitcher, 8⅞ inches high. 2. Goblet, 5⅞ inches high. 3. Covered sugar, 6¾ inches high. 4. Wine, 4¼ inches high. There are five different variations of "Hobnail" pattern illustrated here and many more were made. 5. Sauce, footed with crown points in ruby-stain, no thumbprint on base, 2½ inches high. 6. Celery vase, "Hobnail With Fan", thumbprint base, 3 rows ruby-stained hobs, 6⅞ inches high. 7. Cream pitcher, "Hobnail, Thumbprint Base", 4¾ inches high, 3 rows ruby-stained hobs. 8. Milk pitcher, "Hobnail, Thumbprint Base" with no ruby-stained hobs, but with stained thumbprints on base, 7 inches high. 9. Tumbler, 3 rows ruby-stained hobs, no thumbprint base, 3⅞ inches high.

Bottom Row — "Late Fleur-de-Lis", made 1897-1898 in Pittsburgh by the forerunner of the J. B. Higbee Glass Co. 1. Vase, 10 inches high. 2. Tumbler, 3¾ inches high. 3. Water pitcher, 8¼ inches high. 4. Rare mug, 3½ inches high. 5. "Beauty" pattern by Pioneer Glass Co. similar to "Pioneer's Victoria", top row, this plate. Water pitcher, 9¾ inches high. 6. Salt shaker, "Beauty" pattern, 4 inches high. 7. "Gloria" pattern, made by the Ohio Flint Glass Co., 1906, marked "KrysTol". Tumbler, flared top, 4 inches high. 8. Sauce dish, "Gloria" with gilt, 4¾ inch diameter. 9. Tankard pitcher, "Gloria", with gilt edge, 8¾ inches high.
